From the Founder's Desk

In a great step towards extending the benefits of higher education to underprivileged tribal students, Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences has completed one year as a Deemed University. KISS, the world's first and only university exclusively for tribal students, was established in 1993, with only 125 tribal children at a rented house in Bhubaneswar, and two and half decades later it stands as a unique model of empowerment for the tribal students.

It currently houses 27,000 tribal students and is considered to be the world's largest intervention wherein 50,000 children from deprived indigenous communities of Odisha and neighbouring states are empowered with holistic education from Kindergarten to Post-Graduation along with boarding facilities, clothing, healthcare, vocational and life skills free of cost. KISS has a strong alumni body of 12,500 empowered youth, well placed and driving change for themselves, their families and communities. An additional 10,000 students are getting a new lease on life in the ten satellite centers of KISS in ten districts of Odisha. From a mere institution, KISS has now become a revolution in the lives of tribal people.

KISS and its students have achieved accolades from India and abroad on different occasions. The students of KISS have excelled in academics and co-curricular activities. It shows that given the right opportunities, underprivileged children can also excel. It is KISS' constant endeavour to bring out merit in them and make them empowered and self-reliant.

KISS, in its course of operation for the last 25 years, has collected many achievements in its kitty. It has been conferred with Special Consultative Status by UN-ECOSOC since 2015. The students of KISS have made up to IITs, NITs, IIMs and other organizations of repute. They have participated and won in Olympics, ASIAD, Common Wealth, South Asian Federation Games and many other prestigious sports events. It is in the list of top 500 NGOs of the world and top 10 in India. It has been certified with Platinum level Guide Star India Award for maintaining financial transparency.

We are extremely glad that we shall celebrate the Silver Jubilee of KISS this academic year.

As an individual, I started with nothing in hand, except the experience of severe poverty and hunger and strong passion to create a model to eradicate poverty and hunger through education two and a half decades ago. CARE Philosophy

About four decades ago, Dr. Samanta lived in a remote village in Kalarabanka in Cuttack district of Odisha. The village lacked basic amenities, even electricity. During that period, new clothes and sumptuous food were a luxury he and his siblings could not even dream of.

However, throughout his life, his mother's advice echoed in his ears. She would say this in Odia— “***Jake loke na kahle bhalo, sei jiyanta jivane marlo***”, meaning ***if a human life isn't appreciated by others then it isn't worth living***. This became the motto of Dr. Samanta's life and it motivated him to continuously work selflessly, without ever deviating from the path of honesty despite running mammoth organisations, such as KIIT and KISS.

Dr. Samanta's lifelong passion has been to spread happiness among the deprived. He strongly believes that a man is the sum of his experiences from the past. Even though he is sometimes saddened by the glaring inequalities in society he realises that the five fingers cannot be the same. Quite early in life, he learnt that one can spread happiness by small acts of giving, and he has continued to practice this throughout his life, making his students at KISS the focus of all his love, compassion and care.

A true life is lived when one takes the experience from the past and utilises it by not letting his fellow human beings suffer the way he did. One should never forget the past. About KISS - Biography

KISS at a Glance

Odisha is renowned for its immense indigenous population, which comprises 24% of the total state's population. Unfortunately, these communities remain one of the most marginalised and deprived in modern Indian society.

Dr. Achyuta Samanta, the founder of KIIT and KISS, realised the difficulty faced by tribal communities in transitioning into mainstream society and he attempted to remedy this by founding KISS, in 1993. The institute, which started with only 125 tribal students in a rented house, has spiralled into the world's largest and only institute providing free education from Kindergarten to Post-Graduation with vocational and extracurricular training, free lodging and boarding, state-of-the-art pedagogy and facilities exclusively to more than 27,000

Deemed-to-be-University Status

On the auspicious occasion of Ganesh Chaturthi last year, KISS was granted Deemed-to-be-University Status by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India vide its Letter No. F.9-14/2011-U-3(A) dated 25th August 2017. It has become the first tribal university both in India and the world. Though Indira Gandhi National Tribal University has been established before, it enrolls students of all categories, while KISS University is exclusively for tribal students. KISS has been declared a Deemed University under De-Novo category.

Over the past year, the University has introduced seven new innovative departments in its first phase of development, to provide impetus for research on tribal studies and to help KISS achieve a place of prominence in the global academia.

About KISS - Innovative Pedagogy

KISS employs a number of innovative pedagogies that help it create the unique learning environment that it is reputed for. Foremost among these is its holistic approach to education which ensure that it focuses on all-rounded development for young tribal learners. This approach is aimed at educating students while simultaneously providing them with life-skills that help them integrate into adult-life post-education, along with work-skills that will make them valuable and competent additions to an ever-changing and demanding workforce.

The tribal population have a distinct identity of varied knowledge, practices, rituals and culture that makes them stand out. Although they accept living with deprivation, KISS motivates the indigenous community to get enrolled and benefit from education. In the long run, this will augment the communities' capacity to aspire.

Due to underdevelopment in indigenous areas, tribal children have to be taught in residential schools. However, the residential schools in these areas face serious problems.


Some of these problems are listed below:

- Lack of adequate infrastructure
- Severe bottlenecks of teacher absenteeism
- No toilets in schools
- Lack of an adequate number of female teachers to inspire girls to study
- Lack of basic amenities in spite of all constitutional promises.
- Difficulty in bridging language gaps between Non-Oriya speaking tribals and Oriya syllabi

Some of the innovative approaches used at KISS are listed below. These approaches are employed in several different academic and co-curricular programs that are described in later sections.



KISS provides:

- Free education
- Free boarding
- Free lodging
- Free healthcare facilities
- Smaller classes with a Teacher-student ratio of 1:35.
- Well trained teachers customising learning to the indigenous students
- Modern state of art infrastructure
- Pedagogy that blends academics and sports
- Zero drop-out rate.

In spite of all modern facilities given to the students, there is a definite rooting to their culture. During the students' early childhood, they are taught in their mother tongue to bridge the language gap that tribal students face while transitioning from diverse tribal languages (and their many dialects) to the state language of Oriya.

Life skills training and adolescent education empower the students. The students are also given:

- English training keeping in view the needs of the market economy.
- Coaching for competitive exams for admission to higher-education institutions in India,
- Entrepreneurial skill development
- Fully financed and aided opportunities to study at KIIT, for meritorious students
- The training to be financially independent and self-sustaining after graduation

60% of the students at KISS are girls. They are given special training for reproductive and sexual health. The girls are leaders of change at KISS, which aims to be a safe environment with zero tolerance for sexual violence.

KISS creates a platform to the students to interact with national and international dignitaries, academicians, policymakers, leaders, Nobel laureates, journalists, lawyers, bureaucrats, actors, sportspersons, writers and much more. This helps students identify role models while giving them global exposure.

KISS is funded by KIIT, a sister concern that makes it a stand-alone model in the world. This unique financial model is the best example of Corporate Social Responsibility by any university. KISS' success encourages the students to fulfill their dreams and empower themselves as well as the community through passion, dedication and the spirit of Art of Giving.

Social Innovation to Ensure Sustainability

Social Innovation is an efficient and sustainable solution to a social problem. By providing holistic free education as the solution to eradicate poverty, KISS provides a prime example of the success of Social Innovation. It targets poverty by educating children and making them self-sufficient. In the long term, it is hoped that this approach will reduce the problem of transmission of poverty to future tribal generations.



Tribal populations have a distinct identity of knowledge, practices, rituals and culture that makes them unique. Although they accept living with deprivation, KISS motivates the indigenous community to seek enrollment in school and benefit from free education. In the long run, KISS' mission is to augment these communities' capacity to aspire.

Earn while you Learn

“Earn While You Learn” Program provides opportunities to the students to earn while they are learning through part-time jobs and entrepreneurial projects that prepare them to shoulder professional assignments with relative ease.

Aims of ‘Earn While You Learn’:

1. Prepare students to shoulder professional assignments with relative ease through vocational training and skill development.
2. Impart necessary occupational skills among tribal students to mould them into successful entrepreneurs & make them fit in the job market.

So far, KISS has given appointment to 50 students, trained under Sports Authority of India, as sports trainers to assist in-house trainers. They will coach 5000 students of KISS selected in 50 different sports according to various sports parameters, strengths and capabilities after conducting special tests.

Further, 80 girls trained under Handicrafts Technical Training Programme under HRD Scheme on Embroidery cum Applique Craft and Tribal/Saura Art sponsored by Office of Development Commissioner (Handicrafts), Ministry of Textiles, Government of India were appointed as master trainers to teach the skill to 2000 fellow girls at KISS.

How does it work?



1

Skill Development Program at KISS links education with productivity, economic development & individual prosperity. Therefore, all 27,000 students at KISS are divided in four age groups- sub junior, junior, senior, super senior.



2

Different levels of vocational training and skill development are imparted to each of these age groups. Each student is trained in a trade of his/her interest, with vocational training running concurrent to formal education from Std VI to Std X.



3

The large scale products, made as a result of these vocational activities are readily saleable in the market. KIT, a large University with an area of 25 sq. km, 18000 students and 5000 staff, needs these products in large number and is a ready market.



4

One third of the surplus from each sale of products is distributed among the children engaged in a particular vocational education. This way, each student manages to make Rs. 700/- to Rs. 1000/- per month, alongside their free education, realizing the goal of ‘earn while you learn’.



5

Students have the option to send this money to their parents living in villages in abject poverty or to deposit in their bank accounts for their future. More importantly, children are able to acquire skill in a vocational trade so that when he or she passes out is empowered with a skill that will enable them to earn their livelihood.

Student Interview #1 - Ms. Sumitra Nayak

Seventeen-year-old Sumitra Nayak, from KISS, is the **first Indian female to be nominated for the coveted 2017 International Children's Peace Prize** for her display of courage to make a difference in improving children's rights.

The prize was launched by Kids Rights during the 2005 World Summit of Nobel Peace Laureates at the Capitol in Rome, chaired by Mikhail Gorbachev. Since then, a Nobel Peace Laureate has presented the prize every year to young heroes.

Sumitra, **Captain of Rugby Girls Team**, has braved struggles to emerge as a winner, trend setter and an achiever. She comes from a poor family in a remote village in Jajpur district, Odisha. Her mother worked as a domestic maid and father as a daily-wage laborer, whose wage would be channeled into purchasing country liquor. From quite a young age, Sumitra braved all manner of struggles - lack of finance, torture at home, no proper school, assault by her drunkard father, regular fights between the parents and dropping out of school to take care of 2 younger siblings. After enduring constant abuse at the hands of her father, one day, Sumitra's mother ran away with her three children, seeking refuge in Bhubaneswar with the assistance of one of the employers of her mother.

She joined KISS in 2008 in Grade IV, with the help of a well-wisher and rest we can now say is definitely history. Sumitra started to practice Rugby in 2009. In 2012, she played her first State match. Two years later, she participated in the U13 Women's Rugby World Cup, followed by the National Championship and the National School Games. She helped her team clinch bronze medal in the Asian Girls Rugby Sevens (U18) held in Dubai last year. Now, she is in the first year of her Bachelors in Education and aspires to be an IAS officer.

Commenting over her nomination for the International Children's Peace Prize, the euphoric Sumitra said, "I am extremely happy to know about it. However, all credit goes to Samanta Sir who has transformed my life." Meanwhile, expressing gratification on Sumitra's nomination for the award, the Founder of KIIT & KISS, Prof. Achyuta Samanta has congratulated her for making our state and KISS very proud through her outstanding achievements.'It was love at first sight with rugby for her. Though she loved physical sports, she couldn't play any games in the village,

because girls were not given that freedom. Even if she showed interest, the villagers would comment that sport is not for girls. Fortunately for Sumitra, she had the backing of her mother, who asked her to break the notions of the society and follow her heart,' says her institute.

She started rugby practice in 2009, and under the guidance of her coach Rudrakesh Jena in 2012, she played her first State match. Two years later, she participated in the U-13 Women's Rugby World Cup, followed by the National Championship and the National School Games. She helped her team clinch bronze medal in the Asian Girls Rugby Sevens (U-18) held in Dubai last year. Sumitra was also invited to deliver a TED talk in Pune last year and was introduced as a dreamer, achiever and a trend setter.

Her success story has inspired many children of her age at KISS to join up. 'My vision of this world is where every child grows up to be a change-maker continuously aims to solve problems around them and gets to build empathy as a skill. This will change the world!', she says. Fondly called as Rugby Rani by Dr Achyuta Samanta, founder KISS Sumitra says rugby has given meaning to her life. '**In fact, rugby is my life**', she says.

Student Interview #2 - Mr. Santha Ram Majhi

Santha Ram Majhi is an admirable student dedicated to his studies, and an exemplary trainee of the **Life Skills based Sexual and Reproductive Health Educational Program (LSE) program**. He is the youngest member of his family. His father earns the minimum daily wage for agriculture labour, occasional road work and protection of the forest.

Santha Ram Majhi was enrolled at Niljee High school - Niljee and completed his Class 10 here. The distance from his school to his village was 2.5 KM. Majhi usually covered the distance by walking, and occasionally on his friend's cycle during the monsoon season. Majhi successfully secured 74% in his course at Niljee, and he was ranked 4th in his class at his school. During his time at Niljee, Majhi participated in Debate club, usually arguing on social and political issues. He traditionally secured 1st and 2nd rank at District level along with cash rewards.

Majhi went on to study +2 Arts at Sri Jagannath Maha Vidlaya, Karangamal – Karangamal Gram Panchayat. During this period he worked with his father repairing roads, earning Rs 300 for a day's work. Majhi used his wages to purchase a second-hand cycle, as the commute from his college to home was 10 km. He also bought test-papers and sample tests for his final examinations. Majhi secured 68% marks in his exams and was ranked 4th in college among Arts students. The Government of Odisha, awarded Majhi with a laptop, for achieving high grades at his college.

After this, Majhi went on to study +3 Arts Odiya Honors at Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences, Bhubaneswar. He was informed of KISS from an Admission advertisement in Sambad paper. A friend helped him to gather more information on KISS, and his maternal uncle submitted his admission form manually at KISS. After being selected to pursue his chosen course at the institute, local MLA and his members ensured his travel to Bhubaneswar and Majhi began his enrolment procedure.

Majhi joined the Life Skills based Sexual and Reproductive Health Educational Program (LSE) program. This allowed him to increase his thinking power – influenced his decision making – increased presence of mind – and become a leader. Now, he is heading a group under LSE training program.


Majhi believes that the LSE program helped him to participate in TATA STEEL – Youth leader events. He was honoured for his ideas, service and thoughts on HIV. Students from various colleges at Jajpur District, Odisha participated in his plenary discussion on HIV. Ms Bedamati Pattnaik, from KISS, guided Majhi through this event.

Locally, Majhi organised village programs on Community Mobilization, Early marriages, HIV, Superstition. Large numbers of villagers attended these programmes as well as their Sarpanch and Zilla Parishad members. Majhi's experience and practice served him well as he came 1st in a State Debate hosted by Odisha State AIDS Control Society OSACS. He was also ranked 2nd amongst the junior category in a debate hosted by Commissionerate police, Bhubaneswar, on the topic 'Police our Friend'. Majhi was invited to deliver a speech at Block level by block officials on behalf of GOND tribe.

Majhi's family members dream and encourage him to pursue his dreams to become a politician so that he can give back to society. He states that KISS has brought revolution in his life. It has helped in developing his personality. People living in his home village, have a lot of respect for him and seek opinions from him regarding simple and complex issues. This makes Majhi very happy as he is now able to practice what he loves to do which shines through this admirable personality.

Student Interview #3 - Mr. Bhubaneswar Chhatria

Bhubaneswar Chhatria is one of our brightest students, and a star pupil of the Life Skill Education programme at KISS. The eldest of five siblings, Chhatria has chosen to reinvest the knowledge he gained at KISS into his community by organising rallies on social issues including HIV, Malaria, Gender Equality, Child Marriage.

Bhubaneswar Chhatria is the eldest of five siblings. He feels very close to his family, and it saddens him that the eldest of his three sisters is tied down to house chores as she did not have the opportunity to study. Chhatria's father is a farmer and occasionally carries out labour work in their village. His mother also assists his father in farm-related activities like clearing up the bushes around the fields; transporting crops in the area and more.

Chhatria completed class V at his local village school. He then moved to his maternal uncle's village, Danojhola, to study until grade VIII. After this, Chhatria attended Panchayat High School Buddhi-Komna until Class X. The daily commute for Chhatria was 14 km daily, to and from school. At school, Chhatria actively participated in debates on topics such as Vanmahotsav day and Energy Conservation Day. He successfully secured the 2nd position at his inter-school competition. Overall in his studies, he scored 63%, and he was ranked 5th in his class. Chhatria went on to study his +2 arts at Panchayat Samiti Junior College, Komna. His maternal uncle was an army man who helped to fund Chhatria's studies. During +2, Chhatria commuted 3km from village using a cycle. He scored 70% marks and was ranked 3rd among college peers.

Chhatria then began his +3 Arts studies at KISS, Bhubaneswar. He had little knowledge about KISS in the beginning. Coincidentally, at block Tehsildar office while applying for his caste certificate, he met with a KISS alumni, who inspired him to join the institution. He found out about the application procedure by himself, travelled alone to reach Bhubaneswar and finally submitted his application. Chhatria began to make his way back home and met some acquaintance's on the way to the station. He only had Rs 500 in his pocket and felt very tired once reaching the station.

Chhatria and his friends took a rest in the station. All was well until railway authorities awoke them. The authorities caught hold of him, and he was fined Rs 350 as he had not purchased any ticket for travel and was resting on the platform. Frustrated by his constant lack of funds, Chhatria resolved to pursue his higher studies at KISS.

At the time of his admission, Chhatria visited with his father, who was astonished to see how knowledgeable his son has become in a single visit to KISS. While leaving home, his Mother advised him to, "study hard and become a person that the entire village will admire and fulfil (your) dreams". As Chhatria stepped onto the KISS campus, he learnt English and ensured he utilised the facilities provided by the institute to their fullest extent. Chhatria participated in debate, essay and quiz club. He achieved 2nd place in the state-level essay competition on Subash Chandra Bose; ranked 3rd in the state-level discussion on Birsa Munda and at college level ranked 3rd in competition on Essay and quiz. Chhatria joined Life Skill Education and found the ten core skills helpful to apply to his life. Chhatria chose to give back his knowledge and organised a rally on social issues including HIV, Malaria, Gender Equality, Child Marriage. These rallies helped in generating awareness among youth and villagers. Children also participated fully in these rallies.

KISS augmented Chhatria vision, and now he wants to join the Civil Service of Odisha State and then the Central government. For this, he must then join and enroll in Civil Service Coaching at college. Chhatria believes that every student of KISS should be mindful of the institute's development and that alumni should continue to network and use facilities provided by KISS and contribute to society so that Dr Samata's life lessons continue to reach others.

Alumni Interview #1 - Dr. Bhojanga Naik

Dr. Bhojanga, lives in Keonjhar District and is the eldest son in his family. He began his primary education at his local village school, following which, he joined Ram Krishna Mission from grade six to 10. Dr. Bhojanga came to Bhubaneswar in 2004 and joined KISS in 2009, for +2. There were 10, 000 students attending KISS at this point and this was a huge shock for Dr. Bhojanga. His previous school, Ram Krishna Mission, was more intimate with only 60 students that he was very familiar with. However, some time after joining, Dr. Bhojanga was very happy to be a part of such a large school where he could meet and become friends with a variety of students from different parts of the State.

For Dr. Bhojanga, studying is something he always enjoyed however he found it difficult to understand everything. Coming to KISS was a very different experience for Dr. Bhojanga however, he said, KISS was the place where he learnt the skills to study. He begun meditating regularly at KISS which helped his concentration improve. He was amazed at the holistic style of teaching that KISS offers. Dr. Bhojanga was able to study alongside practise his hobbies too. He has an interest in Indian Classical music and devotional music. Dr. Bhojanga said, “KISS offers many things and I was able to practise my talents. I improved a lot after this and with my parents support I took a greater interest in education. It really helps when you have family support. It is important to become something one day and I was able to do this at KISS”.

Dr. Bhojanga is very appreciative for everything Dr. Samanta has done for the local people, children and society. As a child he was similarly inclined to help his community, and after experiencing the great work of Dr. Samanta, he realised the difficulty of completing this work too. However, the persistent efforts of Dr. Samanta have allowed him to see that he also wanted to dedicate his life to help society. This helped Dr. Bhojanga realize the power of determination and consistency in life.

The very next day Dr. Bhojanga went to the campus and presented his documents to start his studies. His BDS course took the duration of five years to complete, from 2011 to 2016. He said that his journey through the course was long but he learnt many things. "Although it was difficult, and at the beginning I was crying everyday, I never had any regrets. I follow Swamiji and Dr. Samanta implements everything that is written in the books, in real life - they are both my role models". Dr. Bhojanga's mom and dad are very proud of him and have always supported him. He is grateful that they knew about the importance of education before he even started his studies.

Dr. Bhojanga's dream came true after he was awarded 2 lakh, 50k rupees. He believes in taking risks in life otherwise he can not go further. With this bursary, he decided to open his own surgery, called Aesthetic Clinic, in Keonhjar District, about 30km away from his village. He also bought a bike for his father, which made the travel a lot more convenient for his parents. Dr. Bhojanga laughed and said, "The bus journeys although funny now, were not practical for me especially when the trains were not working because of the flooding. Sometimes I would take the night bus and the driver would fall asleep at the wheel!". Dr. Bhojanga enjoyed advising the local people

who attending his clinic with medical, or health advice and they always praised him for being a good doctor and helping them - this made him very happy. Unfortunately, due to time, financial and workload constraints during his final year of study, he was forced to discontinue his clinic.

Instead, Dr. Bhojanga joined KISS in August, 2017. He sat his exam in May 2018 and passed on his first attempt with an exceptional result. He finally became fully qualified in his field after many years of immense hard work. He received many congratulations from his family and friends and he was extremely driven to keep on working hard and helping others along the way. In his own words, "For now I have not stopped and I must carry on going. I feel really happy and fortunate. This is not the end, this is just the beginning. If God will carry on blessing me as he has, then I will keep on going forward".

Having worked at KISS for a year now, he recently cleared his OAS exams, for dental cadre. Bhojanga is extremely appreciative of the unwavering help and support that he has received from KISS and Dr. Samanta in his life and career.

Alumni Interview #2 - Ms. Saladi Murmu

Ms. Saladi Murmu hails from the village of Goudagan in the Mayurbhanj district of Odisha. Her family is relatively financially poor, and as a result paying for a good education was always a struggle on Ms. Murmu's family. Despite the poverty, Salady always dreamt of studying well and having a job that would secure her career along with her family's financial future.

At a young age, Saladi joined her local village school, where she studied till 3rd standard. Shortly thereafter, she convinced her parents to shift her to a Girl's Hostel located approximately 30 kilometers away from her village. Here, she studied for another two years, free of cost, and when Saladi was in 6th grade, she shifted to another hostel in pursuit of better education. Her second institute, the Eklavya Model Residential School Dhangeda, was home to Saladi for another four years.

After graduating 10th standard from her second hostel, Saladi's brother told her about free education offered at the Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences. Saladi recalls that she was initially intrigued by the promise of free, quality education and was impressed by the interest KISS took in its alumni's lives and career opportunities. Confident that she was good enough to be accepted, Saladi tells us that KISS was the only university she applied to for her 11th and 12th education.

Sure enough, Saladi's confidence in her abilities proved right, and in 2009, she joined the KISS family. Initially, she remembers struggling to adjust to the sheer size of KISS; whereas her earlier schools had fewer students in each grade, KISS was mammoth in comparison, with well over 20,000 students at the time. After this initial adjustment period, Saladi quickly looked to the positives, and found that she had access to dreamers much like herself - hopeful young tribal students from tribes all over the state, and from surrounding states all converged at KISS, providing Saladi with a second family she had never expected to have. These were the friends who rallied around her during her time at KISS, becoming her support structure in those two years.

Saladi remembers enjoying classes at KISS immensely. She says she drew inspiration from her teachers, particularly her Botany and Zoology professors, who inspired her to pursue agricultural technology as a career path. Saladi tells us that this period was instrumental in defining her work ethic, as she would seek moments of peace and quiet to study on the rooftops of the KISS dormitories till midnight everyday. She also learnt yoga during her time at KISS, using the practice as a form of meditation and self-discipline. Saladi also mastered the skill sufficiently to win 1st prize in a yoga competition held at KISS. Alongside her education at KISS, Saladi used to attend extra classes at KIIT University, where she improved her spoken English skills.

After graduating with a Second Division degree, Saladi joined Odisha University of Agricultural Technology where she spent 4 years completing her Bachelor's Degree. Following this, she passed her JRF competitive examination, and qualified to join Navsari Agricultural University for a two year Master's degree in Agronomy. Recently, Saladi was recruited as an Assistant Agricultural Official for the Government of Odisha's Department of Agriculture and Farmer's Empowerment, which she looks forward to joining within the next next two months.













HANDICRAFTS UNIT

KISS has taken up the handicraft technical training under HRD scheme in collaboration with the Ministry of Textiles, Government Of India. The second phase of this program commenced on November 2018 at KISS' main premises. Training is being imparted in trades like Terracotta, Paper Maché, Golden Grass and Wood Carving. Training sessions in these specialized skills are being imparted to over 160 student trainees in 8 batches. Our target is to train 20 students per batch for a duration of four months.

In this span of time, 576 training hours (at 6 hours per day) are earmarked to cover the curriculum. 16 trained Master Trainers (two per batch) have been engaged to impart the assignments. The curriculum has both theoretical and practical components. Student trainees over 18 years of age, who display a keen interest in learning a trade and who are willing to undergo training beyond regular academics are selected as per GOI guidelines.



The performance of the handicraft sector is directly tied to the performance of the economy of rural India.

In this span of time, 576 training hours (at 6 hours per day) are earmarked to cover the curriculum. 16 trained Master Trainers (two per batch) have been engaged to impart the assignments. The curriculum has both theoretical and practical components. Student trainees over 18 years of age, who display a keen interest in learning a trade and who are willing to undergo training beyond regular academics are selected as per GOI guidelines.

The program aims at building vocational skills in specialized areas for marketable skills enabling gainful engagement in future careers of the student trainees. The trainees receive additional benefits of stipend for attending the program. The experience so far has been very encouraging as the trainees repeatedly take keen interest and actively participate in the programme, mastering new skills with joy.



More so, this sector is considered to be one of the most promising and productive sectors influencing the economy of rural and tribal Odisha.

KISS has made necessary arrangements allowing flexibility and adjustment of training time in reference to regular classes to avoid clashes and inconvenience. KISS is committed to scaling up the program, by building on the learning and good practices that assure its success.

Through handicraft training program KISS aims to not only provide employment for the development of our economy but also to develop sensible artistic approach of self-expression for the artisans as handicrafts are matchless expressions as they represent culture, tradition, and heritage of them and country. After training, student are given continuous guided support for post-training production by a pool of master trainers. Various types of soft skills training are imparted via this program, including costing, packaging and marketing development to boost their entrepreneurship skills for their upliftment and prosperity.

MOTHER TONGUE BASED MULTI LINGUAL EDUCATION

WHAT IS MTB-MLE?

MTBMLE is a well-established strategy to address language gaps at early learning. The **MTBMLE** programme is sustained within the formal education system in KISS, the pioneering Centre of Excellence on mother tongue based early childhood education in the state of Odisha, in collaboration with **Bernard van Leer Foundation (BvLF)** from 2013. All these years, through Mother Tongue Based Multi Lingual Education, KISS has been filling up that gap in the learning process of the tribal students. **Children at early learning stage are facilitated education through (MTBMLE) approach** introducing: **Transition Curriculum**-an innovative pedagogic initiative, **teaching and learning tools** in 10 tribal dialects.

This program not only aims to improve the quality education, but also to make holistic mainstream education more accessible to young tribal children getting enrolled in KISS. It is not only promoting the growth of tribal language and culture in the state but is also aiming to develop cognitive, social, physical and mental abilities of these young children leading to an easy assimilation into mainstream schooling. Moreover, in a globalized society, it is more important now than ever to both be communicative in the dominant language, as well as preserve one's cultural identity. KISS has not only set up the largest nodal centre for tribal mother tongue based education in the world but also moulds these indigenous students as 'agents of change' for their own community and the world.

WHY MTB-MLE?

Five major reasons:

1. Primary school Children develop strong L1 competencies.
2. They perform well in all subjects.
3. They develop a higher level of self-esteem.
4. They develop a solid foundation to learn additional languages
5. Promotes more participation of the parents and community in the school activities.

PROCESS

Mother-tongue-based multilingual education (MTBMLE) as a strategy for addressing poor educational performance in school education among the early school children is well-established today in KISS, Bhubaneswar. The tribal children are being taught in their native languages as local language enhances the learning capacity of a child even in higher primary classes along with regional Languages. **Children at early learning stage are facilitated education through (MTBMLE) approach** introducing the Transition Curriculum-an innovative pedagogic initiative, teaching and learning tools in 10 tribal dialects. This program not only aims to improve the quality education, but also to make holistic mainstream education more accessible to young tribal children getting enrolled in KISS.

KISS trains tribal children in multi- languages so that they can explain their own community people in advanced education using the native language as well as regional/ national. Building a strong L1 foundation, the student is then bridged to his/her second language/s (L2) by creating a joyful learning environment of acquiring the skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing.

ENGLISH ACCESS MICRO-SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The English Access Micro-Scholarship Program (Access Program) is an initiative of the U.S. Department of State, to provide significant English-language learning experiences to bright non-elite 13 to 20 year-old students.

It also has the goal of improving students' appreciation of U.S. culture and values, encouraging critical thinking and open-mindedness, and improving performance in regular school classes. At KISS, the program provides a foundation of English language skills to 750 talented indigenous students. Thus far, KISS has hosted four programs of this initiative since its launch in 2009.

The ongoing fifth edition of this program, which commenced in 2017, will culminate in 2019. The opening ceremony for this session was graced by the Regional English Language Officer, **Dr. Bradley Horn**.



Tribal children are more marginalized than children in mainstream communities. They have the uphill task of learning and mastering their own language, the language of the state, and their national language in addition to English language for higher education.

The Access Program has also helped students build their personality through the framework's adoption of oral-aural, learner-centered and activity-based approaches.

The activities undertaken to fulfill the aim include project work, activities that promote reading with comprehension, quiz, role-play, skits, dialogue, dramatization, discussion, debate, language games, simulating, real life situation, using newspaper clipping, multimedia, using internet, movies, music, riddles and puzzles, pair work and group work. Enhancement activities in the form of exposure visits to shopping Malls, the Planetarium, Nandankanan Zoo, the Tribal Museum etc have also been adopted.

Tribal Access students have not only been able to communicate but also have performed in English Plays, Skits, Songs, and Mock Assemblies, in addition to Anchoring when national and international dignitaries visit KISS (including academicians, corporate leaders, writers, activists, legislators, Magsaysay award-winners, and diplomats from various countries including United States of America etc). They also shared their feelings after being enrolled in the Access Program, reflecting on how the program has changed their life.

This had a spill-over effect in raising the students' performance in their regular academic activity. Many of our English Access tribal students have been successful in joining specialized higher education degrees like Law, Engineering (B.Tech), Medicine (MBBS), and Diplomas in various Engineering trades and Social Sciences.

The manner in which the Access program has touched students from Primitive-Tribes is unprecedented in indigenous Indian history.

Many of our Access alumni are actively pursuing higher education which demands a high level of English proficiency.

Largely, the Access Program at KISS has curbed further alienation and has greatly contributed to the mainstreaming of indigenous children.

SALIENT FEATURES:

- 850 tribal students of KISS have successfully graduated from 4 prior Access Program sessions.
- Current program is the 5th Access session in progress with 100 students enrolled for this 2017-19 batch.
- Students have been immensely benefitted by this program. All are doing higher studies including professional courses like Medicine, Engineering, Law, Nursing etc.
- One female Access student, alumnus Ms. Seema Hansdah, is studying medicine and has visited USA on the 10th Anniversary of the Access Program.
- Laxman Hembram, an Access Alumni had the opportunity to travel to Seoul, South Korea, to present a paper on Climate Change under the United Nations Environment Programme and was also selected by the United Nations to take part in the 'Malala Day' youth session at UN headquarters in New York.
- Two students – a boy from primitive tribal group and a girl visited US for Cultural Immersion Program.
- An Access student – Sanatan Majhi from primitive tribal group, while in Access program topped the 10th Board examination in KISS
- Access students have participated in National level Yoga Competition.
- Many Students have qualified and joined TCS company (Multinational Corporation).
- 500 Access students participated in two Guinness World Records endeavored and successfully achieved - Forming the Largest Human Sentence- 15,225 students of KISS made a human sentence - 'WE URGE FOR WORLD PEACE' and Most Simultaneous High-Fives in a Human Chain- 25,151 students participated in making of this record
- 2 Access students have topped the 10th Board examination in KISS in the recent past.
- Shanti Murmu of current Access Program & UNFPA has been selected by Ashoka Foundation as a 'Youth Venture' for grass-root work by her. She works on her concept of 'Parivartan'; Change-making in village level. She was a panelist in UN Women event in Delhi and was also co-panelist with Nobel Laureate Prof. Mohammad Yunus in Shared Value Summit 2016. Shanti also joined the Global Walk in South Korea.
- Two students - Thakur Hansdah and Banamali Muduli, went to South Korea for an exchange program in 2018.

TATA CONSULTANCY SERVICES

KISS has been facilitating TCS's Free Employability Training Program at KISS campus as well as at a district level for last five years.

Last year, KISS-TCS signed the renewal of their MOU which focuses on the extra-areas to be covered under the program.

TCS Free Employability Training Program features:

- 1) 40 Hours internal training
- 2) 100 Hours by TCS, Coordinated by Kolkata office

These 40 Hours are coordinated by TCS, Bhubaneswar office while the 100 Hours of training are coordinated by TCS, Kolkata office in consultation with KISS. The 40 hours of training are scheduled in the evening, so that they do not interfere with regular class hours and trainers are recruited locally.

Further, for 100 hours of training, trainers are assigned from TCS, Kolkata office. These training are provided to 4th, 5th and 6th Semester graduate students of KISS.

Free Employability Training comes under Affirmative Action program of TCS which aims at providing 100 hours of Free Employability Training to final year undergraduates from SC/ST/BPL/Minorities communities.

- 5. Mathematics**

At the end of 100 hours of training, Candidates will receive a Certificate of completion & appreciation which will increase their employability in the corporate world.

In addition, post-training TCS Recruitment team will conduct an aptitude test (objective type) for the participants. Those who clear this test will be interviewed.

On successful clearance of the interview process, the candidates would be provisionally selected for TCS BPS entry-level employment (Non-Voice, back office data processing role).



GKL TRAINING

GKL Training at KISS is provided by GKL Foundation, South Korea, in partnership with KISS and Hanseo University (South Korea). The program provides 6 months training on electrical and electronics. Technical sessions, practical sessions, field visits to grid offices etc.

The GKL Foundation is a grant-making organization established in 2014 by Grand Korea Leisure (GKL) which is a subsidiary of government-run Korea Tourism Organization and performs the tourism business for foreign tourists. Under supervision of the Ministry of Culture, Sports and Tourism of the Republic of Korea, the GKL Foundation supports public benefit programs for betterment of Korea and global society with funds provided by GKL which donates a certain portion of its total sales every year for the fulfillment of corporate social responsibility.

Established in 1992, Hanseo University is a private higher education institution located in the large town of Seosan, South Chungcheong in South Korea. Officially accredited and recognized by the Ministry of Education, Korea, Hanseo University is a coeducational higher education institution. The university offers courses and programs leading to officially recognized higher education degrees such as bachelor degrees in several areas of study including liberal arts, engineering and design disciplines.

Recently, a GKL Vocational Training Centre, sponsored by GKL Foundation, was inaugurated at KISS in 2017. 63

Life Skills based Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH) Education

From the year 2012 to 2014, in a phased manner, the life skills based SRH education was scaled up to 500 residential schools covering 318 tribal residential high schools and 182 Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalayas (KGBVs) in collaboration with ST and SC Development (SSD) and School and Mass Education (S&ME) Department, Government of Odisha respectively. KISS provided handholding and technical support in implementation of Life skill based SRH education program in schools. From 2015 programme in government tribal residential schools was scaled up by the ST & SC Development Department, Government of Odisha.

At KISS, LSE sessions are transacted to students of grades 6th to 9th through co-curricular approaches by trained teachers covering over 9,000 tribal adolescents. At the college level and school level peer educators have been trained in the life skills based SRH education and are encouraged to promote life skills education and address myths and misconceptions about ARSH among peers. Activities are backed up by counselling, health services, menstrual hygiene promotion, creative communication activities and community awareness on ARSH issues by trained peer educators during summer vacation. In order to promote counselling services teachers have been identified and their capacity has been developed on counselling. Further, the sanitary napkin manufacturing unit established with support from UNFPA is operational and partially supported by KISS for its maintenance including staff for its management.

From 2009, with the support of **United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA)**, KISS has been endeavouring to hone the abilities of its Adolescents through Life Skills Education (LSE) based Adolescent Reproductive Sexual Health (ARSH) education in order to enable them to deal with the demands and challenges in their life effectively.

The proposed intervention in KISS aims at building institutional capacity and networking with other potential institutions to overcome knowledge and skills deficit in the state for the promotion of LSE.

During these years, several initiatives have been undertaken for promotion of LSE among tribal adolescents in KISS. KISS has emerged as a resource agency with a critical mass of resource persons and a wide range of communication and training materials with socio-cultural sensitivity. Most of the resource materials used for LSE programme in the state were developed and tested at KISS.

In last year, emphasis has been placed on:

- Enhancing knowledge and skills among 12,500 adolescents of tribal and disadvantaged communities on SRH through life skills education at KISS
- Promoting healthy menstrual hygiene practices among adolescent girls studying at the InstituteTraining of newly inducted teachers in KISS on LSE-SRH
- Reorientation of 90 teachers on LSE-SRH at KISS
- Training of Peer Educators at school and college level
- Refresher Training of existing Peer Educators on ARSH issues
- Community level awareness through Peer educators
- Life Skill Based SRH Education Sessions
- Promoting menstrual hygiene and Counseling services
- Capacity Building training of Teacher Counsellors on counseling
- Printing of resource and communication materials

International Internship and Voluntary Program (IIVP)

In addition to Indian interns, a host of international students and research scholars are invited to KISS under IIVP.

Under this program, students from across the world visit KISS to take up study or research at KISS in a few chosen fields, building long-lasting bonds with the tribal students they teach.

Within the last academic year, KISS has hosted students from multiple countries with very varied interests.

This has included volunteers from the United States, United Kingdom, Romania, Russia, England, Indonesia, France, Switzerland, and South Korea, among others.



Special Mentions



Hanseo University:

Students from Hanseo University come twice a year to render voluntary services and other activities with children of the school. This year, they volunteered to do some social work outside the school. Along with the staff of KISS, they visited the beach and cleaned the beach near Konark. They were also involved with other activities at KISS.

Hanseo University is a private university located in Seosan, Taean and Namsan, South Korea. The university was established in 1991 and provides courses in a wide range of liberal arts, engineering and design disciplines. The university exchanges students and faculty through sister relations with 58 universities in 12 countries, and around 500 foreign students study at the school.



AEISEC Interns:

A number of interns spend quality time at KISS around the year. These interns work with the children and teach them various arts and crafts and also take some classes in foreign languages. We have students from the US, Russia and France on the AEISEC Programme.

AIESEC is the world's largest non-profit youth-run organization. It is an international non-governmental not-for-profit organization that provides young people with leadership development, cross-cultural global internships, and volunteer exchange experiences across the globe. The organization focuses on empowering young people to make a positive impact on society. The AIESEC network includes approximately 27,000 members in 127 countries.

'Fresh Water Carp Culture & Brood Stock Management and Quality Seed Production' Training Programme



The National Fishery Development Board (NFDB) sponsored 5-day training programme series for the tribal youth on aquaculture and hatchery management in two modules i.e., Carp Culture - an innovative approach (15 programmes) and Carp Brood stock management and quality seed production (10 programmes). KISS organised 13 skill development training programmes with the released fund of Rs. 5,62,500. The training series was inaugurated on 8th August 2017 at KISS campus in the presence of Dr. B. K. Das, Director, Central Inland Fisheries Research Institute(ICAR-CIFRI), Barrackpore as Chief guest, Dr. J.K. Sunderay, Director, ICAR- CIFA, Bhubaneswar and Shri Surendra Kumar Patra, Deputy Director, Department of Fisheries, Government of Odisha, as guest of honours, Shri R.N. Dash, Secretary, KIIT and KISS, Dr. Prasant Kumar Rautray, C.E.O. KISS, Dr. N. Sarangi, Former Director, ICAR-CIFA, and Shri Debendra Kumar Samal, Deputy Director (Research & Development), KISS.

The dignitaries addressed the trainees and highlighted the importance of aquaculture and technological advancements that led to the increase in fish production. They pointed out the importance of skill development in aquaculture, which is a proven enterprise providing livelihood security through small scale farming as well as entrepreneurship. The role of fish in human nutrition and health management was also elaborated on. They specifically mentioned the importance of these trainings and the support provided by NFDB and Department of Fisheries, Odisha, in promoting aquaculture development and self-employment opportunities for the tribal youth. A vote of thanks was extended by Shri Debendra Kumar Samal, Deputy Director, Research and Development, KISS.



In all the trainings, equal participation of women trainees was ensured. Hands on training on various aspects of pond management were conducted in the KISS farm ponds. Care was taken to explain the physical and chemical quality of water and soil along with the simple methodologies for detecting water quality and the measures to overcome the problems. Identification of right type of fish seed for stocking and seed transport procedure were demonstrated along with precautions to reduce stress during their transport. Specific care was taken to explain fish diseases including their preventive measures and treatment methodologies. All efforts were made to facilitate easier understanding of aquaculture techniques and inculcate the idea of self-employment among tribal youth.

The participants were taken for an exposure visit to farm facilities, hatcheries, laboratories and Agri-business incubator of CIFA, Bhubaneswar. In order to provide knowledge on aquaculture technology applications in business, the trainees were made to visit a local private fish farm.

A total of 264 tribal youth from various districts of Odisha and neighbouring states, belonging to 38 tribes, were trained through 13 programmes conducted at KISS Campus.

Senior officials from UNFPA, REC Foundation of Rural Electrification Corporation Limited (REC) and KISS meet at KIIT for the official launch of





MISSION UDAY

Mission UDAY is a joint initiative by REC Foundation of Rural Electrification Corporation Limited (REC), the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), the Government of Odisha and the Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences (KISS). This unique partnership between a leading development agency, state government, academic institution and corporate sector, is built on the philosophy that CSR should be the means, and not the end.

At the inaugural event, Dr. Jennifer Butler, Deputy Regional Director, UNFPA Asia Pacific, and OIC UNFPA India and Bhutan, said that Mission UDAY is a multi-stakeholder project envisioned to address the challenges faced by young people from vulnerable tribal communities of Odisha and seeks to position youth at the centre of development initiatives of the state. She highlighted that the project will endeavour to create change agents in the community and build young leaders who would engage in social development processes and influence their peers for the betterment of their communities. **70**

Case Studies of Recent Graduates:



The project aims to build leadership and social entrepreneurship skills of 1000 young boys and girls, and inculcate values of active citizenship, so that these young people can, in turn, engage in social development processes in 1000 remote habitations of the State, and influence at least 20,000 more like-minded youth to widen the footprint of change. The project will be initially implemented in Koraput, Malkangiri and Rayagada Districts, in close collaboration with the local administrations.

Pinning high hopes on the project, Shri Achyuta Samanta, Hon'ble MP and Founder of KISS and KIIT, said that KISS is privileged to be a part of this challenging project and will work closely with the district administration in achieving the envisioned goals.

The project was launched in May 2018, in the august presence of Shri Ramesh Majhi, Hon'ble Minister ST & SC Development; Shri Achyuta Samanta, Hon'ble Member of Parliament; Dr. Jennifer Butler, UNFPA Asia Pacific, and OIC UNFPA India and Bhutan; and Shri S.K Gupta, Director Rural Electrification Corporation Ltd. The event had a participation of more than 250 youth from districts and officials from different departments. Mr. Venkatesh Srinivasan, Assistant Representative UNFPA, Dr. Deepa Prasad, State Head, UNFPA Odisha and other officials from Kalinga Institute were present at the launch event.

- CO₂ reduction by steam cooking, solar water heating, use of bio-gas and solar PV system = 4860 tons/ year

KISS & **Sustainable Development**



The **Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)** are a bold, universal agreement to end poverty in all its dimensions and craft an equal, just and secure world - for people, planet and prosperity by 2030. The 17 SDGs and 169 targets are a part of Transforming our World : the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, which was adopted by 193 member states at the historical UN General Assembly Summit in September 2015, and came into effect on January 1st, 2016.

The SDGs have been developed through an unprecedented consultative process that brought national governments and millions of citizens from across the globe together to negotiate and adopt the ambitious agenda.

Despite the recent formulation of the 17 SDGs by the UN in 2015, KISS has been addressing the various goals identified by the UN since its inception. In fact, in many ways, KISS was formed as an answer to these goals; the institution was inspired by its founder, Dr. Achuyta Samanta, and his vision of a world free of hunger, poverty and illiteracy. It is home to over 27,000 underprivileged tribal students, and several thousand staff who work at the grassroots as change makers in these underserved communities. Accordingly, KISS priorities efforts to preserve the various tribal cultures and languages from over 62 tribes of Odisha, while simultaneously empowering its students.

The endeavours of KISS have taken the form of a silent revolution which has transformed the lives of over 150,000 indigenous people, while contributing to nation building. Since 2015, KISS has been accorded Special Consultative Status with the UN Economic and Social Council, while also being associated with UNDP. Further, KISS has frequently leased with the UN Development Programme, UN Women, UN Population Fund, and the UN Department of Public Information.



- Ensuring zero drop-out rate, through focus on quality education, which prevents early and forced marriages, and associated unwanted pregnancies.
- Implementing Life Skills Education which spreads awareness about gender equality through student and community engagement, via peer education in villages.
- Bringing innovative initiatives, such as the Kalinga Fellowship, which unites leaders in different sectors like corporate, government and civil society to create an environment of zero tolerance to sexual assault and trafficking of girls in Asia.
- Ensuring more than 50% female enrollment and employing a greater ratio of female staff (70%).

6 CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION



GOAL:

Ensuring access to clean and pure drinking water for all and safe sanitation

KISS' EFFORTS:

- Creating changes in the tribal childrens' habit of open defecation and encouraging use of clean, safe toilets instead.
- Installing sewage treatment plants to process waste material.
- Installing a reverse osmosis plant to filter safe drinking water, which is then packaged for use on campus and sale elsewhere.
- Prioritising personal hygiene habits of students.
- Providing mega laundry facility on campus to encourage cleanliness.
- Facilitating frequent Swacch Bharat campaigns and bi-annual sanitation drives in tribal villages.

7 AFFORDABLE AND CLEAN ENERGY



GOAL:

Using clean and renewable energy for sustainability

KISS' EFFORTS:

- Distributing more than 40,000 solar lanterns in the tribal hinterlands of Odisha, and giving training on their usage.
- Using renewable infrastructure on campus.
- Installation of an award-winning, steam powered Mega Kitchen.
- Using grid-connected solar panels to provide electricity requirement of the institution.
- Installing and using biogas plants.
- Implementing rainwater harvesting to collect, filter and re-use rain water.
- Using solar water roof-top heaters to heat water for use in the university.
- Using sewage treatment plants to treat waste for toxicity before disposal.

Activities ranging from forming village level committees, survey on various parameters at the District, Block and Village levels, identification of needs and beneficiaries, creating awareness on education issues, health and hygiene. Through this centre KISS also connects with the community.

KISS FOUNDATION UK, England and Wales, registered with charity number-1144046 is set up with a vision of educating and empowering the poor marginalized section of society who do not get square meal a day. It will support Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences (KISS) which provides education to indigenous children with food, education, health facilities, sports free of cost from Class 1 to Post-Graduation & professional courses. The charity will broadly involve in education/training, the prevention or relief of poverty and will help children and youth. It will operate to make grants to organisations and provide advocacy/advice/information.

KISS FOUNDATION USA was incorporated on the 11th of August 2015. The purpose of the Corporation shall be exclusively charitable and education. One can make donations, grants and contribution to the KISS Foundation USA to support the education of impoverished children and young people in India and other countries, support the provision of healthcare, accommodation and training to children and young people in need, to raise awareness of the work carried out by the corporation and other educational and welfare organizations. KISS Foundation USA (Employer Identification Number: 47 – 5363659) is an organization exempt under the Internal Revenue Code classified under the Public Charity section.



2 BRANCHES OF KISS SET UP IN BANGLADESH

Recognizing the success of KISS model in Bhubaneswar, Bangladesh is all set to replicate a congruent version of it in Jessore and Dhaka.

'Bhoomi Puja' was performed in January, 2018 for the two international branches of KISS, in Bangladesh. The traditional ritual to dedicate the land for the purpose was conducted in the presence of Dr. Achyuta Samanta; Md. KISS shall provide technical and managerial support for the functioning of the two branches.



New Innovative Infrastructure

Over the past year and a half, as KISS expanded into a university, and forged new MOUs and expansion projects, the main Bhubaneswar campus has overseen the inauguration of new infrastructure, including:

1. College Campus 3

With the formal establishment of KISS University last year, the college section of KISS was shifted to a brand new campus (Campus Number 3) in September 2017. This campus houses a state-of-art Learning Centre, containing a library crafted in coordination with Tata Steel, a mini computer lab, learning rooms, an indoor conference hall, as well as an outdoor amphitheater space.

2. Children's Playground

KISS proudly opened a large new playground, complete with playground equipment, next to the Smart Classroom building on campus. 4. Puffed Rice Factory

In order to provide our large student body with a filling and nutritious diet, KISS continuously undertakes nutrition projects to supplement the students' meal-plans. Accordingly, a puffed rice factory was recently opened on campus, which provides Muri (puffed rice) to students as a healthy and nutritious evening snack.


"In the semifinals, the first 20 metres, I did not push much and coach pointed out that 'you have to make a better beginning. So in the final I rushed the first 40 metres. I was running with eyes closed, whether medal comes or not, I wanted to improve my timing."

"When I opened my eyes, the race was over. I did not know what has happened. People said you have won a medal, but I did not believe, I did not pick flag until I saw the result on display screen."

Dutee could not stop smiling after the win. "It is my biggest medal, I am already 22 and I had never participated at Asian Games before because of hyperandrogenism. It was Olympic for me, I trained for six hours in a session for this."

Dutee had become only the third Indian to qualify for the women 100m event at the Rio Olympics. She had timed 11.69 but did not make it to the final. However, after winning two silver medals at the Asian Games, Dutee was unable to stop smiling as she ushered in a new dawn for her athletic career.

Congratulatory messages have been pouring in for her from all quarters. The Chief Minister of Odisha Sri Naveen Patnaik; Union Sport Minister Colonel Rajyavardhan Singh Rathore and Founder of KIIT & KISS Dr. Achyuta Samanta have congratulated her for achieving such an outstanding feat.






India to Host it after 45 years




Republic Day at KISS

These people make up less than 5 per cent of the world’s population but account for 15 per cent of the poorest. They speak an overwhelming majority of the world’s estimated 7,000 lesser-known languages and represent 5,000 different cultures and traditions.

“The 2018 celebration of International Day of the World’s Indigenous Peoples marks the **11th anniversary of the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples**. The theme of International Day of the World’s Indigenous Peoples 2018 is **‘Indigenous peoples’ migration and movement’**.”





KISS CELEBRATES LANDMARK RULING OF SUPREME COURT ABOLISHING SECTION 377

On the occasion of the decriminalization of Section 377 of the Indian Penal Code, officials from KISS celebrated the historic decision along with officials from British Council, India and SAKHA.

Shortly thereafter, KISS University announced a new collaboration with the Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiative to join hands together in taking a pioneering step, to promote behavioral change, by engaging with transgender communities, particularly transgender women and children. Sakha, the transgender community network, will partner with KISS in this initiative and the first phase pilot will be launched in Rayagada district.



EXPRESSED IN INDIAN RUPEES

Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences (KISS) was started in the year 1993 with just 125 tribal students. With the growth of KIIT Group of Institutions, KISS has also grown as the biggest residential tribal institute of the country. KIIT is the backbone of KISS. Now, 27,000 tribal children of 62 tribes, including 13 primitive tribes, are pursuing their education from Class-1 to post-graduation levels in KISS.

The sources of income of KISS are as follows;

- As per the resolution passed by the KIIT Society, 5% of the total turnover of KIIT. This financial KIIT has donated Rs. 91.79 crores operations.
- As per the statutory rules of the KIIT University, each and every staff contributes 3% of his/her gross salary to KISS amounting to Rs. 6.41 crores (approx.).
- The Contractors/Vendors of KIIT Group of Institutions contributed to KISS an amount of Rs. 0.53 crores (approx.).
- The donations from civil society and well-wishers contribute benevolently for this noble cause amounting to Rs. 4.54 crores (approx.).
- Donations received from different organizations, corporate houses like Give India amounting to Rs. 9.80 cores (approx.).
- Further, Grants & others received from various organizations for projects Rs. 10.60 crores.
- Balance funds requirement was met from own sources / reserves, etc.

Total recurring expenditure for the year 2017-18 is Rs. 94.85 crores.

Total 5% seats in professional education programs of KIIT University are reserved for meritorious students from KISS. Several meritorious students from KISS are studying free of cost in KIIT Group of Institutions in technical and professional courses, such as Bachelor of Medicine & Surgery (MBBS), Dental Sciences & Surgery, Nursing, Engineering, Masters in Computer Application (MCA), Bachelor / Masters in Law, Management (MBA), Diploma in Engineering, etc. This involves a financial outlay of Rs. 20 crores (approx).

KIIT University also provides support services by way of visiting faculty, transpiration, maintenance for electricity / water supply system, medical assistance, security, etc. and these costs will add up to further Rs. 10.00 crores

Thus the **Overall Recurring expenses** will be in the range of **Rs. 124.85 crores**.

In addition the **Non- recurring expenses** during the year are **Rs. 33.60 crores**.


